INITIAL SCENE ATTENDANCE REPORT				
Initial Findings				
<p>Between the hours of 18.00hrs and 23.30hrs on the 17th December and between the hours of 10.00 and 15.00hrs on the 18th December 2015 I was requested to attend 99, High Street, Sandford, following the discovery of the body of Mr E in suspicious circumstances.</p> <p>I have been asked to consider the following:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Examine the scene in order to establish the sequence of events leading to the unlawful killing of Mr E. 2) Establish if there is evidence within the crime scene that may lead to the identification of the person or person/s responsible for his death. <p>These notes are the initial observations of my attendance at the scene on the above dates.</p> <p>There was considerable disturbance within the lounge of the address with furniture upturned and heavy bloodshed. The overall distribution of blood staining present in the lounge is, in my opinion, in keeping with Mr E having been involved in some sort of struggle whilst he (Mr E) was injured and bleeding, predominantly whilst he was on the floor and/or on top of the sofas. Mr E's body has then at some point been turned over onto his back. Whilst I am unable to comment with regards to whereabouts in the property Mr E sustained his injuries, it is likely in my opinion that the majority were sustained whilst he was in the living room.</p>				

There are also signs of disturbance in the kitchen with footprints in blood found on the floor. In my opinion, an individual whose footwear was blood stained had walked around the kitchen and back into the lounge on several occasions, transferring significant amounts of blood in between the two rooms in the process. In addition, someone with a hand(s) wet with blood has been inside the kitchen cutlery drawer, touched the left corner of the cooker top and has handled the back door chain.

There appears little activity upstairs apart from the landline phone, ordinarily located in the lounge, which has been discarded at the top of the stairs.

I directed CSIs at the scene to recover a number of blood swabs, which may be 'foreign' to the scene, and possibly shed from the offender rather than the victim. There was also a number of blood drips on the trousers of the victim which may have originated from someone other than the wearer. I have suggested that a number of these areas/items are suitable for consideration of a fast track submission.
